Land & Water Conservation Fund State Assistance Program

The United States Congress passed the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965 to help preserve, develop and ensure access to outdoor recreation facilities. With earnings from offshore oil and gas leases – zero taxpayer dollars - the Act provided funds for the primary purpose of creating outdoor recreation opportunities on state, local and federal lands for all, directing 60 percent of LWCF into the State Assistance Program to be invested closest to where Americans live.

In the first 50 years, over 42,000 LWCF grants to states and localities built a nationwide system of parks in rural, suburban and urban areas, comprised of parks close-to-home, county recreation areas, state parks, and conserved natural treasures. \$4.2B in LWCF leveraged match from state, local and private sources representing at least an \$8.4B total investment in public outdoor recreation resources. These extraordinary partnership investments have resulted in public parks in every geographic region of the United States, every county, nearly every city or town, and territory.

Research in every state and territory found on-going investments in public outdoor recreation to be a fundamental community need. Demographic changes; shifts in population centers; health, wellness, and fitness issues; and facility rehabilitation point to the urgency of meeting outdoor recreation priorities. States and localities alone cannot keep up with these challenges.

In 1976, an Act amendment eliminated the 60 percent stateside/local guarantee, shifting appropriations to not less than 40 percent for federal land acquisition. With the 1998 introduction of other non-recreation facility programs, LWCF for State Assistance side further decreased.

Land and Water Conservation Fund Act expired in 2015 and subsequently reauthorized by the Budget Bill through FFY18. Over FY2005-2014 decade, stateside LWCF averaged 12% - from a low of \$19M (FY09) to a high of \$91M (05). In FY16 Congress allocated \$94M for state/local assistance.

NASORLO and our partners are the principal advocates seeking equitable funds for the LWCF State Assistance Program, a longer program authorization, funds to address rising urban recreation needs, and program modernization.

With no predictable program timeframes and lack of stable funding, cities, counties and states are tested to create momentum meeting today's requirements for the close to home outdoor opportunities in the places where most Americans live.
